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Administrator Comments

As I write this article each month, I always review what I wrote the previous year for the newsletter. After looking at the newsletter article from April of 2020, it is clearly evident what little we all knew would happen in the weeks and months following. In that letter, I had written a message to the class of 2020 talking about the District's commitment to continuing with as many of the events as possible that we typically hold in the spring. Although spring athletics, the prom and our drama club talent show didn't happen, we did hold a virtual senior dessert night and we did conduct an in-person graduation later in the summer. Since then, we have been in-person in school most days. While not perfect, we have attempted to take a measured approach to the situation and have tried to make learning a priority. Further, the patience of our parents has also been commendable. As we look forward to spring, we are looking to host a drama club production, conduct spring sports, hold some sort of prom, honor our seniors at Senior Dessert and have graduation on time. These events will look different than in years past. As we are planning these, we once again appreciate all of the understanding shown by students, parents, staff and the community.

The following is how I opened my newsletter article in April of 2020, and I think much of it still holds true. I have just changed a couple of sentences to make them a bit more relevant to now. *Thank you to our students, families and community members for your support and patience during the COVID-19 health emergency. The events of the past year have been fast paced and ever changing. I ask for your continued support and patience for our school staff as we learn together how to do things dramatically different than we did just a year ago.*

FINAL THOUGHTS

To the Class of 2021, your experience here at John Edwards High School has been vastly different than that of the Class of 2020 or any other previous class. The Class of 2020 had so much end so abruptly their senior year, but they held strongly together and were able to celebrate their achievements at graduation. Spring and Seasonal Allergies

It goes without saying the last year has been a tough one - for adults and children alike. As the temperatures continue to rise and the green grass starts to appear - here are some tips for yourself and your kids to get spring started off on the right foot!

- **Head Outside** - Being out in nature is an instant stress reliever and can make everyone feel more calm and relaxed. Even being outside for just 10-20 minutes can boost out Vitamin D requirement, making us feel happier. For those with allergies, avoid outdoor time on windy days or early in the morning. Get outdoors after a good rain - the rain helps wash pollen and other irritants from the air!
- **Practice Good Allergy Hygiene** - After being outdoors, be sure to remove clothes and shower to remove pollen from skin and hair. Avoid hanging the laundry of those with seasonal allergies on the clothesline. Pollen easily sticks to fabrics and can trigger symptoms later on.
- **Consider Over -The-Counter Medications-** Anti-histamines, decongestants & nasal sprays are readily available and offer relief from sneezing, itching, watery eyes and runny noses - the most common symptoms of seasonal allergies.
- **Drink Up** - Remind your family members with seasonal allergies to drink plenty of water. Staying properly hydrated means your body can react better to the pesky allergens, and not need to produce such high levels of histamines due to lack of water. Water is an inexpensive and effective way to regulate your seasonal allergies and is good for overall health! Challenge your family to drink more water every day for the next month and see how much better you all feel!

4. Student & Staff Recognition

Superintendent Cronan reported the girl's basketball team just concluded their season with a 7-12 overall record. The boy's basketball team still have few games prior to their tournament game.

5. President's Report

A. Board Member Attendance

Vice President Thomasgard reported that board members Thomasgard, McGrath, Hildebrandt, Martinson were in attendance. Board member Daven was absent due to prior obligation.

6. Administrative Reports

A. Report on ESSER (Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund) – Superintendent Cronan

Superintendent Cronan reported on the Cares Act Funding/ESSER. In late spring, the District received an ESSER grant in the amount \$63,595. The District has used all of those funds to date. Expenditures included HVAC upgrades, PPE, technology equipment and other cleaning supplies. ESSER 2 is the second relief package and the District will be receiving approximately \$250,000. The allocation is determined by the federal formula for Title. We will offset technology, nursing and extra maintenance costs with these funds. The District will carry forward \$80-\$100,000 to be available for next school year for intervention or other outstanding items needed

. There is a possibility for a third round and at this time we are unsure of the amount but it could be a significant amount.

B. Report on Life Tools Group – Principal Christy

Principal Christy reported that the Life Tools Group just recently began. This is a social/emotional group lead by Heather Lisitza. Heather Lisitza applied for the grant and received it through the Marshfield Clinic. This is an after school program. There are two 8-week sessions, the first session is for girls and the second is for boys. The students learn tools to use in their

day to day lives to help achieve goals and to learn relationship skills. The program is to help kids be more successful at home and at school. Pam Sorbo is assisting Heather Lisitza with the program.

- C. Report on CTE Month – Principal Shroda, Marissa Rebeschke
Principal Shroda reported that February is CTE month. Principal Shroda stated that our three CTE instructors, Steve Birno, Marissa Rebeschke and Gary Spencer, continue to strengthen our Career and Technical Education program.
Marissa Rebeschke reported that there are a number of CTE courses available to our students in many pathways. Many of the classes are life-long learning and some are for dual-credit which can be taken through Mid-State Technical College. These credits will carry with the student when they move on from John Edwards High School.

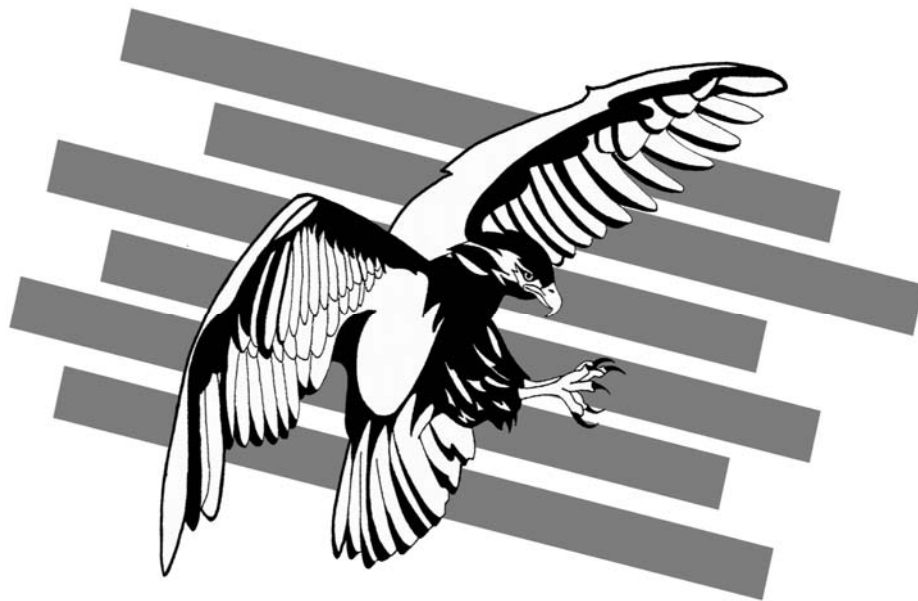
